Let's build gardens everywhere, putting it in is the easy part, maintaining is the easy, but hard when people who have been there leave. Partner looks more at the human element and DL is more of systems.

EP In some respects this is truly ideal place because of URI down the road with their new program. One concern I have though is the small local agriculture will feel because of the potential undercut. Master gardens can be your biggest allies.

DL the community is really strong at Compass. The one thing about school gardens is that it is educational but not for profit. Believe that the produce should stay in the cafe. The purpose is that RI schools are buying local foods.

SS just curious what is happening in Bridgeport now? DL Bridgeport we learned to transition to let go. Still getting funding from the community and private funding. They just changed the way it is being run compared to the way it was when it was set up.

BL is looking at this in the idea of do we tweak the existing garden or do we look bigger.

NS Going back to the idea of the produce. We out source our food and at the moment we do not have a kitchen but notice that it says kitchen in the proposal? DL we are about finger food. Wash it and put it out. The idea is that just starting this with Compass and then other schools want to jump on.

RA my major concerns are the garden organization and who would be the main person that would take it on here.

BL the sense that I am getting from teachers is that it is great idea but having a point person outside of the teaching staff that would be working with the kids and the farm. NG discussing what would be the criteria for the job of this point person.

DL need 4 months to do the planning and design of the garden.

NG we had our retreat today where half the staff self selected this as a growth goal.

DL we will have to fundraise for it. It would be good to go into it with 2 years of funding when all is said and done.

BL you don't know what is out there until you look. In terms of state-level funding, BL believes that the Department of Health is a more likely source than RIDE.

Strategic Plan Updates

<u>Charter Renewal</u>: The charter renewal process, though nearly at its end, is not quite yet complete. These are the final steps that will take place before Compass goes before the Council of Elementary and Secondary Education this fall.

- Draft a bylaws revision re: Save the Bay seat on Council (in progress)
- Providing factual corrections to the charter renewal report (complete)
- Meeting with Matt Plain regarding the new charter form (in progress)
- Complete the charter form and return to the charter renewal office (in progress)
- Name The Council of Elementary and Secondary Education as additional insured on the Compass D&O policy (complete)

Of note, The Compass School and Blackstone Academy were the last to be reviewed using the former framework. A new framework is in development currently and Compass will be reviewed using this revised format in the next charter renewal period, five years from now. In the new system, student achievement outcomes are weighted far more so than classroom practices and curriculum.

<u>Development</u>: In the 2015-2016 school year, the development team's efforts yielded \$54,830, exceeding the \$50,000 target set by Council by \$4,830. The \$20,000 development director salary expense brings the net total to \$34,830.

I met with Development Director Abby Colby Cooper regarding the Compass Farm project. Her assessment is that a large project like this one will generate attention and cultivate philanthropic interest. While some of the funders' gifts will be directed toward the operation of the project, having such an attraction on campus and part of the Compass package will provide more incentive and interest in capital projects (like new building construction or renovation).

Blended Learning

- FUSE RI: Following a competitive process including interviews, we were selected by The Highlander Institute as a FUSE district. This means means that The Compass School will have access to two highly trained FUSE fellows for a two-year time frame. The intent is for the FUSE fellows to support Compass with our personalized and blended learning initiatives, which have a place on our strategic plan. The well-defined programming at FUSE will provide a strong framework for personalized professional development for our teachers.
- Heidi Vazquez will serve as our school's Personalized Learning Lead Teacher. In this
 role, she will serve as a liaison to the FUSE coaches. Additionally, she has taken on
 responsibilities at the state level as well. For example, Heidi will represent The
 Compass School as a panelist speaker at the statewide "RIDE Powered by Innovation"
 conference on September 17th.
- The team from Envision has completed the wireless infrastructure upgrades that now include Explorer and Discoverer modulars. We are waiting to do the final sign off on the project until all

Facilities Life Cycle: Current Campus

- Swings have been installed.
- The new HVAC unit has been installed.
- RIDE commissioned Jacobs to complete a statewide facilities assessment. The draft
 results have just arrived and Brandee will provide the full report upon request. The
 Compass team is in agreement with much of the report, however we will seek clarity on
 some areas noted below.
 - The deficiencies outlined in the assessment are divided into 5 priority levels, #1 being the top priority that needs immediate attention.
 - Positive information from the report:
 - The Compass school did not have any priority 1 deficiencies.
 - No deficiencies were found in the modular buildings or the greenhouse.
 - Some of the deficiencies identified in the main building have already been corrected via the HVAC purchase that Council voted to approve at the conclusion of FY16.
 - The following deficiencies should be discussed at the site committee:
 - Priority 1 Mission Critical Concerns: None
 - Priority 2 Indirect Impact to Facility Mission:
 - Main building interior paint (we will seek clarification/contest this assessment)
 - HVAC exterior condenser replacement (completed in August 2016)
 - Priority 3 Short-Term Conditions:
 - Pave parking lot
 - Add flashing beacon to school zone light
 - Replace vinyl tile in the main building

- Replace HVAC circulating pump (completed in August 2016)
- Replace canopy and mounted building lighting
- Technology
 - Install security access controls
 - Replace network switching
 - Update classroom AV/Multimedia systems
 - Install local sound reinforcement in instructional spaces
 - Install main telecommunications room ground system
 - Network cabling infrastructure is partially outdated and/or needs expansion (Completed in August 2016)
 - Replace security cameras and recording system add 20 cameras
 - Install a dedicated cooling system in the telecommunications room
- Priority 4 Long-Term Requirements:
 - Replace exterior wood of the main building
- Priority 5 General Improvements:
 - Stripe paved parking lot

Facilities Life Cycle: Future Campus

 Brandee filed the Letter of Intent to enter into the new construction/renovation process with RIDE.

Facilities Life Cycle: Compass Farm

- Along with Monique Bosch and Dan Levinson from Main St. Resources, Brandee co-facilitated a garden tour in Connecticut to visit The Green Village Initiative's community farm and school gardens. 10 Compass representatives, including 2 Investigator students, attended the trip.
- A community discussion about the prospective project is scheduled for Friday, 9/9. 19 Compass representatives have RSVP'd to the event to date.
- A representative from the Lattner Foundation will attend the event on 9/9. Reports indicate that the project is of interest to the organization.
- Brandee met with Kateri Collins, a Compass parent, who is willing to facilitate
 collaboration between West Kingston Elementary and Compass via a garden club. She
 has already met with the principal who is on board. West Kingston Elementary could
 emerge as the first partner school for the project; they do not currently have a school
 garden.

Staff Configuration:

No progress has been made with this area; it was not yet "green lighted" by Council.

STEAM Pilot

- Hilary Downes Fortune attended trainings with Fab Newport over the summer. One of the sessions focused on 3D printers - all attendees received a 3D printer for their school as part of the training. This new tool will be included in our STEAM pilot this year.
- The Investigators (5th/6th) are the first step to collaborate with this new program.

 Discoverers (3rd/4th) will participate 2nd trimester and Navigators (7th/8th) 3rd trimester.
- A Compass parent emailed the following message following the first class. "At diner, our daughter described the science experiment today and we debriefed as a family. It was a joyful family moment. Connecting math, technology, and science to Ava's passion for art is gives us hope for her professional future. Thanks!"
- Positive energy abounds in the early stages of the pilot.

Assessment

- Explorers are using Aimsweb and Pals for assessment.
- Special Education will continue with Aimsweb.
- 2nd 8th grade will use iReady. All teachers have log in information and student accounts are prepared. Teachers will have professional development using the new tool on 9/14.

2016-17 Staff Search Updates:

- All vacancies have been filled.
- We've established a mentoring program where all new staff are partnered with a veteran staff member.

<u>Legislative Updates</u>: No information to report at this time.

<u>League of Charter Schools:</u> No information to report at this time.

Budget

- Due to low ridership, one bus has been eliminated from our bussing fleet. This came at a savings to Compass of \$25,000.
- The Lattner Foundation check in the amount of \$25,000 arrived.
- The legislative grant check in the amount of \$5,000 arrived.

 A parent of a Compass graduate donated \$1,000 to the 2016-17 annual fund. In the note, the parents thanked Compass teachers and administration for the "strong foundation" that the school offered their son who has moved on to high school.

Community Outreach

- Kristen Kardos, Compass parent and staff member attended the Clean Air Force convening in Washington DC. She represented Compass, making connections to our school's mission and also our national legislative representatives.
- I wrote an outreach article that appeared in The South County Press & Westerly Sun "Back to School Edition"
- Council member Evan Preisser is working with colleagues at URI on a Compass-URI
 Connector Path through URI's North Woods. This would offer a nature path that would
 ensure a safer travel between our two schools.

PARCC

- The 2016 PARCC results are now available.
- Compass ranked 3rd in the state (for the second year in a row) for ELA scores at both the elementary and middle school levels.
- Our Math scores improved by 11%, more than 2 times the state average.
- I will host two Test Talk with Ms. Brandee sessions on 9/12 and 9/13 for parents.
